You will experience all of the following attractions on guided tours:

Holiday Inn Capitol - (5 Nights) One block away from the Air and Space Museum.

New National Museum of Crime & Punishment - Opened in May 2008, the museum explores the history of crime, law enforcement, forensic science, crime scene investigation and the consequences of committing a crime.

The United States Capitol - The most recognized symbol of democratic government in the world.

White House - *We have requested a tour and it is currently pending.*

The Library of Congress - The largest national library in the world with more than 100 million items in three buildings.

The Supreme Court Building - Completed in 1935, the Supreme Court Building is located across the street from the US Capitol.

National Museum of American History - newly renovated - Browse through the new state-of-the-art gallery that offers a spectacular view of the Star Spangled Banner, and view the exhibits that top the list of must-sees for any visitor with a taste for true Americana.

National World War II Memorial - The newest memorial honors the 16 million who served in the armed forces of the US during World War II, the more than 400,000 who died, and the millions who supported the war effort from home.



The Vietnam Veterans Memorial - The memorial currently consists of three separate parts: the Three Soldiers Statue, the Vietnam Women's Memorial, and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall, which is the most recognized part of the memorial.

The Lincoln Memorial - Inside, inscriptions from his Gettysburg Address and Second Inaugural Address flank the 19-foot marble statue of our 16th President.

Washington Monument - The most prominent, as well as one of the older, attractions in Washington, D.C. It was built in honor of George Washington.

The Korean War Veterans Memorial - Stop at the triangular field that contains nineteen stainless steel statues that represent a squad on patrol. See the 164-foot long black granite wall that has hundreds of faces etched into it of those who supported the ground troopers.

The Marine Corps War Memorial (Iwo Jima Statue) - One of the largest bronze statues ever depicts the American Flag being raised on Mount Suribachi during World War II and commemorates all marines who have died in battle since 1775.

Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts - A "living memorial" to President John F. Kennedy.





HISTORY COMES ALIVE IN WASHINGTON D.C.!

New Newseum - The only interactive museum of news.

Embassy Row - Embassies, associations, foundations, and clubs have claimed and restored these lovely mansions that were built after the civil war by the powerful and socially elite.

Washington National Cathedral - Standing higher than the Washington Monument, it is the sixth largest church in the world.

The Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial - A unique memorial, it is divided into four outdoor galleries, or rooms, one for each of FDR's terms in office.

Arlington National Cemetery - Veterans and military casualties from every one of the nation's wars are interred in the cemetery, from the American Revolution through the military actions in Afghanistan and Iraq. It is also the final resting place for President John F. Kennedy and Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis. The Tomb of the Unknowns are also located on these famous 612 acres.

The Jefferson Memorial - The 19-foot bronze statue is dedicated to Thomas Jefferson, an American Founding Father and the third President of the United States.

Air Force Memorial - Built on a hillside overlooking the Pentagon, the memorial is bold and graceful and truly representational of the Air Force.

Mt. Vernon - The estate of George Washington is America's most visited historic house. It is both George Washington's home and final resting place.

Old Town Alexandria - Enjoy some free time to explore Old Town Alexandria. Browse the antique and specialty shops and boutiques that give Alexandria its quaint, small-town feel.

Guided Ghost Tour of Alexandria - Follow 18th century costumed guides as they lead you by lantern light telling you ghost stories, legends and folklore about colonial Alexandria.

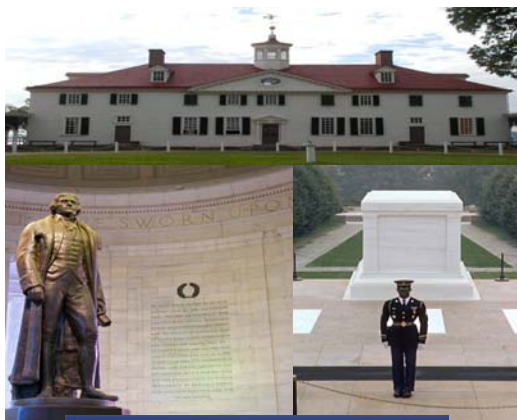
