The energy and excitement is high as we depart Wichita for our Montana & Idaho Extravaganza trip! Cindy has lots of fun planned for you on the bus as we make our way to these breathtaking destinations!

Enjoy the view of Nebraska's landscape that rises from the Missouri prairie lands to the GREAT PLAINS and the foothills of the ROCKY MOUNTAINS. Our first night's stay will be in YANKTON, South Dakota, named for the Yankton tribe of Nakota (Sioux). You're in for a treat as we make a stop at the CORN PALACE in MITCHELL, South Dakota. The Moorish Revival building, a popular tourist destination, is decorated with murals and designs that are made from corn and other grains. We continue our journey north through South Dakota, and stop to tour the NORTH DAKOTA STATE CAPITAL in BISMARCK. Rebuilt in the 1930's, it is the tallest building in the state.

Explore the THEODORE ROOSEVELT NATIONAL PARK, and enjoy the lifestyle and scenes that charmed him in his day. Nestled in the BADLANDS, we stop overnight in historic MEDORA to enjoy the fabulous MEDORA MUSICAL and a tasty PITCHFORK FONDUE DINNER. Old West is still alive in MILES CITY, where a step-on guide tells us about the gunfights and saloons that are part of the city's history. We continue through BILLINGS, and stay the night in LIVINGSTON, Montana.

From BOZEMAN to BUTTE to HELENA...there is so much to take in before arriving at GREAT FALLS, Montana for the night. A boat tour on the MISSOURI RIVER through the GATES-OF-THE-MOUNTAINS astound you as 200-foot rock walls tower above us! Awaken your cu-

riosity as you learn about the challenges faced by the Lewis & Clark expedition when they portaged the great falls of the Missouri River at the LEWIS & CLARK NATIONAL HISTORIC TRAIL INTERPRETIVE CENTER.



The scenic beauty becomes ever more breathtaking as we make our way to GLACIER NATIONAL PARK in Montana. The vast and pristine park encompasses over one-million acres and includes two sub-ranges of the Rocky Mountains, over 130 named lakes, more than 1,000 different species of plants and hundreds of species of animals. We travel the "GOING-TO-THE-SUN-ROAD" through the park and overnight in KALISPELL, Montana.

Departing Kalispell, our next adventure takes us by FLATHEAD LAKE and on to MISSOULA. While in Missoula, we visit the SMOKE-JUMPER VISITORS CENTER to learn about the land firefighters who parachute into a remote area to combat wildfires. Then tour the ELK FOUNDATION'S COUNTRY VISITOR CENTER that reveals the beauty, diversity and importance of Elk Country across North America.



The city of SALMON, our next overnight stop, is a small rural community nestled in the mountains of Central Idaho along the Salmon River. Learn more about the Lewis & Clark expedition and the essential supplies and information that they received from Sacajawea as we visit the SACAJAWEA INTERPRETIVE CULTURAL CENTER. Surrounded by the WHITE CLOUD, BOULDER and SAWTOOTH

Going to the Sun

MOUNTAIN RANGES and the BOISE, CHALLIS, AND SAWTOOTH NATIONAL FORESTS, we stop in STANLEY to visit the REDFISH LAKE AND VISITOR CENTER and eat at the REDFISH LAKE LODGE. After dinner we travel east to overnight in the capital, BOISE. The next day we tour the city and enjoy a great show provided by the dancers in the SPANISH BASQUE COMMUNITY.

Another beautiful sunrise wakes us as we travel to TWIN FALLS. You will see the place of EVEL KNEIVAL's SNAKE RIVER CANYON jump site attempt where equipment failure caused him to land in the bottom of the canyon.

Located eight miles north of Shoshone, hidden under the desert floor, is one of Idaho's greatest unknown wonders, MAMMOTH CAVE. We visit this geological wonder and learn of its strategic uses associated with national defense. After visiting the cave, we'll head for the sun...SUN VALLEY, Idaho that is! There is time for shopping and relaxing as we spend the night in the Sun Valley area, home to several of America's rich and famous!

Visit CRATERS OF THE MOON NATIONAL MONUMENT, which is a geologic wonder cast in a wild and remote landscape. Its central focus is the GREAT RIFT, a 62-mile long crack in the earth's crust. The Great Rift is the source of a remarkably preserved volcanic landscape with an array of exceptional features.

Looking out over the barren expanse south of ARCO, it's understandable why it has been used for nuclear reactor experimentation and development. The town of Arco became the first city in the world to be lit by atomic power from a reactor built near the BORAX III reactor, in 1955, which we see on a self-guided tour. Stops at ATOMIC CITY provide rare photographic opportunities, and GROVE CITY will be where we tour the IDAHO POTATO MUSEUM. Stopping in PO-CATELLO for the evening where we enjoy a COOK-OUT AND WINE at a local resident's private home.

Upon arriving in SALT LAKE CITY, we have a step-on-guide to narrate a tour of the area for us. Founder Brigham Young and his Mormon followers, who extensively irrigated and cultivated the arid valley, continued to face legal prosecution from the US Govern-

ment for their practice of polygamy, which was officially discontinued in 1890 in order to gain statehood. TEMPLE SQUARE in Salt Lake City contains nearly 20 attractions related to the Mormon pioneer history and genealogy. Mining booms and the construction of the first transcontinental railroad initially brought economic growth to the city. Standing at the overlook within the KENNECOTT COPPER MINE, we will see, hear and feel the breathtaking and awesome magnitude of more than 100 years of work. From the overlook, you can watch 240 and 320 ton capacity haulage trucks delivering copper ore. With so many things to see and do in Salt Lake, an overnight stay is needed.

Keep your cameras handy as we depart Salt Lake and continue our journey toward PROVO and PRICE, Utah. Right in the middle of Utah's Castle Country, the area has a large concentration of prehistoric rock art sites. The surrounding scenery is spectacular, featuring fascinating geological formations, lakes and unusual vegetation.

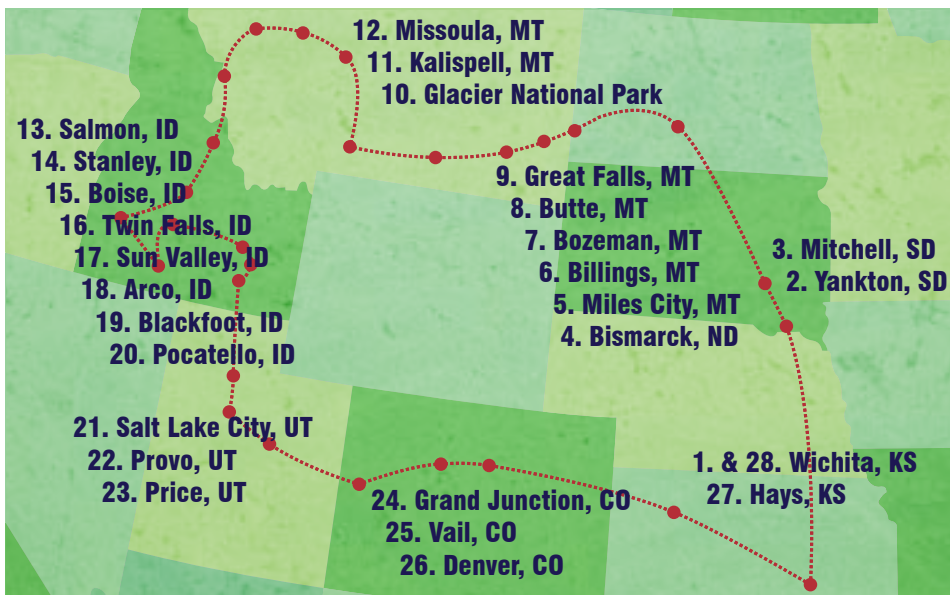
In the morning, visit the COLORADO NATIONAL MONUMENT that preserves one of the grand landscapes of the American West. But this treasure is much more than a monument. Towering monoliths exist within a vast plateau-and-canyon panorama. A COLORADO FARM TOUR completes our day...it's onward to beautiful GRAND JUNCTION to stay the night.

Eat and shop in the quaint town of VAIL, a town that was established in 1962 at the base of the Vail Ski Resort, home of the second largest ski mountain in North America. DENVER will be our stop for the night and tomorrow we make our way back to Wichita, Kansas. Be assured that more fun still awaits you on the bus as we are in the home-stretch back to the Air Capital city!

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## Depart Wichita, Kansas



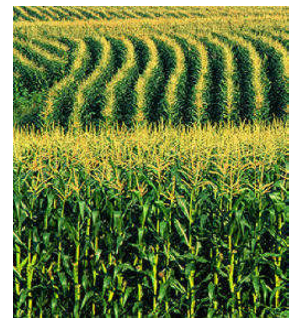

## Nebraska



Nebraska rises from the Missouri prairie lands to the Great Plains and the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. It still echoes the footsteps of explorers, pioneers and Plains Indians.



The state's landscape ranges from rolling hills in the east, to the 20,000 square miles of sand hills in the north-central area, to the high plains and rugged buttes of the west and the moonlike landscape in the northwest. As we travel through Nebraska, be sure and look for the landscape differences on our way to our first overnight stop in South Dakota.



## South Dakota



Our first night's stay will be in Yankton, South Dakota; the original capital of the Dakota Territory. It is named for the Yankton tribe of Nakota (Sioux) Native Americans. Yankton is located on the Missouri River, just downstream of the Gavins Point Dam and Lewis and Clark Lake, and just upstream of the confluence with the James River.



You're in for a treat as we make a stop at the **Corn Palace** in Mitchell, South Dakota—an unusual multi-purpose arena/facility. It is a popular tourist destination, visited by more than 500,000 people each year because of its uniqueness. The Moorish Revival building is decorated with Crop art; the murals and designs covering the building are actually made from corn and other grains.



We continue our journey north through South Dakota, taking in the beautiful scenery along the way.





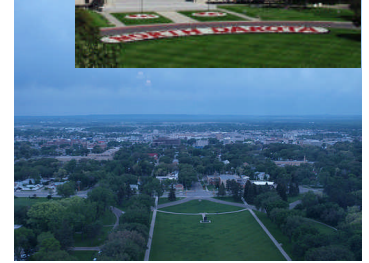
## North Dakota

The **North Dakota State Capitol** in Bismarck is the tallest building in the state. When North Dakota's original, traditional-styled capitol burned in 1930, it was replaced with a much more modern building. Termed the "skyscraper on the prairie," the 19-story capitol is visible for miles around. We will be taking a tour of the capitol building as we travel through Bismarck.

Theodore Roosevelt's experiences here in the North Dakota badlands shaped his adult life, helping him become the Rough Rider, the President, and the world's leading land conservationist. As we explore **Theodore Roosevelt National Park**, we will enjoy the lifestyle and scenes that charmed him in his day.



The West kicks up its heels at historic **Medora**, a unique mix of spectacular scenery, wildlife, entertainment, dining and shopping nestled in the beautiful North Dakota badlands. It is the home of Theodore Roosevelt National Park 36 mile Loop, Museum of the Badlands, Painted Canyon Visitor Center and much more. We see the fabulous **Medora Musical** while there.



You will experience a local favorite; a fabulous **Pitchfork Fondue** dinner, along with free time for shopping, as we will be spending the night here in Medora.

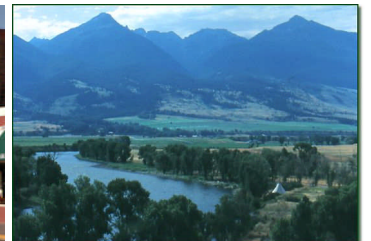


## Montana

The Old West is still alive in **Miles City**—the Cow Capital of Montana. With the world famous Miles City Bucking Horse Sale, the annual Beef Breeders Show, the Fort Keogh Days, the Range Rider's Museum, three historic districts and impressive collections of historic photographs, Miles City keeps the Old West alive through events and exhibits.



A tour of **Miles City**, with a step-on guide, is on the agenda today. You will hear about the gunfights and saloons that were a part of Miles City's history. We will continue through **Billings**, known as Sugar Beet Country, and on to stay the night in Livingston, Montana.



## Montana (cont.)

From Bozeman to Butte to Helena (capital)...there is so much to take in before arriving at **Great Falls**, Montana for the night. A **Gates-of-the-Mountains boat tour** on the Missouri River, with 1200 ft. rock walls above us, is on the agenda today along with a visit to the **Lewis & Clark Interpretative Center** in Great Falls.

Great Falls is one of the main cities that is found along Montana's portion of the Lewis and Clark Trail. It was Lewis and Clark who were the first known white visitors to the area, which they happened upon while navigating the Missouri River. At Great Falls, the Missouri River drops some 500 feet, which results in a rumbling set of rapids and waterfalls. Hence the city's name.

Lewis and Clark were forced to portage around the rapids and waterfalls at Great Falls during their famous Corps of Discovery expedition, and nearly a month passed until they moved on.

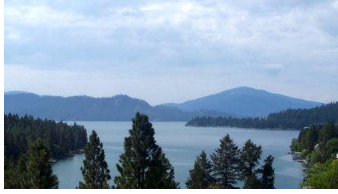


The scenic beauty becomes ever more breath-taking as we make our way to **Glacier National Park**. Glacier National Park is located in Montana, bordering the Canadian provinces of Alberta and British Columbia. The park encompasses over 1,000,000 acres and includes parts of two mountain ranges (sub-ranges of the Rocky Mountains), over 130 named lakes, more than 1,000 different species of plants and hundreds of species of animals. This vast pristine ecosystem is the centerpiece of what has been referred to as the "Crown of the Continent Ecosystem", a region of protected land encompassing 16,000 square miles.

We will overnight in **Kalispell**, Montana after seeing Glacier National Park, including "Going-to-the-Sun Road."



## Montana (cont.)



Departing Kalispell, our next adventure takes us by **Flathead Lake** and on to **Missoula**. Missoula is nicknamed the "Garden City", in reference to the large number of orchard homes that once lined its periphery and an extensive vegetable and flower garden that formed the eastern entrance to the city. Though founded as a lumber and agricultural center as well as a trading post, the basis of Missoula's modern economy includes the University of Montana.



In addition to the University of Montana, Missoula is perhaps best known for being the most politically liberal city in Montana, the birthplace of first woman elected to the U.S. Congress, Jeannette Rankin, and the home of Montana's largest brewery. Missoula is also the headquarters of Montana Rail Link.



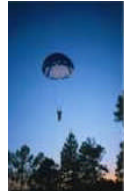
While in Missoula, we tour the **Smokejumper Visitor's Center** to learn about the wildland firefighters who parachute into a remote area to combat wildfires. Another tour we take in Missoula is that of the Elk Foundation's **Elk Country Visitor Center**. It is more than just a museum—it's an experience that reveals the beauty, diversity and importance of elk country across North America.



Salmon, Idaho will be our destination this evening to spend the night.

## Idaho



The City of **Salmon** is a small rural community of 3,300 residents nestled in the mountains of Central Idaho. Located along the Salmon River, "The River of No Return", the City of Salmon is proud of its rich history that includes strong traditions of mining, lumbering and family ranching.

Lewis and Clark crossed the Continental Divide in 1805 into the Salmon Valley during their expedition to the Pacific Ocean and received essential supplies and information from Sacajawea's people, the AgaiDika Shoshone. We will learn more about this history as we visit the **Sacajawea Interpretative Cultural Center**.



## Idaho (cont.)

**Stanley, Idaho** has an ideal situation within the Rockies. It is surrounded by the White Cloud, the Boulder and Sawtooth Mountain Ranges, and many of the spectacular peaks are over 10,000 feet. Three national forests; Boise, Challis and Sawtooth encompass the town. Stanley lies on the upper Salmon River in a wide-open part of the valley known as the Stanley Basin. It is about 130 miles east of Boise, the capital of Idaho.



We will stop in Stanley to visit the **Redfish Lake Visitor Center** and eat at the **Redfish Lake Lodge**, before heading on toward Boise where we will spend the night.



"City of Trees" is the official nickname for the city of Boise. The name comes from the French word *boisé*, which means "wooded." Although historical perceptions of cities aren't necessarily relevant today, the "City of Trees" moniker suits Boise well because of the natural beauty in and around the city.

A city tour of Boise is on the agenda, along with eating and fabulous entertainment by dancers in the Spanish Basque community. We continue our journey through Idaho in the morning.



Another beautiful sunrise wakes us as we travel to Twin Falls. You will see the very place of Evel Knievel's Snake River Canyon jump-site attempt.



Evel Knievel (October 17, 1938 – November 30, 2007), born Robert Craig Knievel, was an American daredevil and entertainer. In his career he attempted over 75 ramp-to-ramp motorcycle jumps between 1965 and 1980, and in 1974, a failed jump across Snake River Canyon in the Skycycle X-2, a steam-powered rocket. The 37 broken bones he suffered during his career earned an entry in the Guinness Book of World



Records as the survivor of "most bones broken in a lifetime." Knievel died of pulmonary disease in Clearwater, Florida, aged 69. According to *The Times* writing his obituary, Knievel was one of the greatest American icons of the 1970s. Knievel was inducted into the Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 1999.

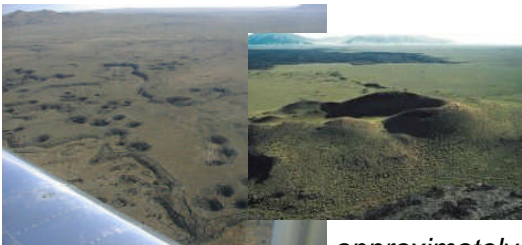
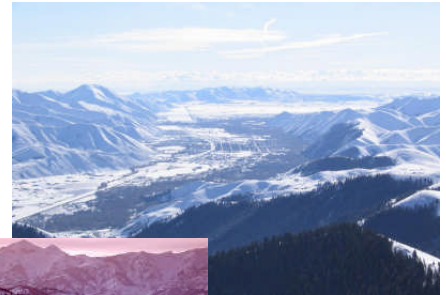


## Idaho (cont.)

We visit **Mammoth Cave**—"the biggest show under the earth." Mammoth Cave is a combination of geological and American history dating back to the Cold War. It even had strategic uses associated with national defense. Located eight miles north of Shoshone, Mammoth Cave is one of Idaho's greatest unknown wonders, hidden under the desert floor. Richard Olsen and his two sons, Paul and James, operate the Idaho Mammoth Cave and Shoshone Bird Museum of Natural History. Olsen obtained title to the cave in the 1950s under the Idaho Small Tract Act. He grew mushrooms there before opening it to the public. Olsen has cleared and maintained a path that stretches nearly one-fourth of a mile deep into the cave's half-mile-long lava tube.



After being in Mammoth Cave, we'll head for the sun... **Sun Valley**, Idaho, that is! There is time for shopping and relaxing as we spend the night in the Sun Valley area. Among skiers, the term "Sun Valley" refers to the alpine ski area, although it is used more generally to speak of the region surrounding the city, including the neighboring city of Ketchum and the valley area winding south to Hailey. The region has been a seasonal home to the rich, famous, and powerful, including Brooke Shields, Adam West, Ernest Hemingway, Tom Hanks, Steve Miller, Demi Moore, Peter Cetera, Clint Eastwood, Bruce Willis, and Richard Dreyfuss, among others.



We visit **Craters of the Moon National Monument** which is a geologic wonder cast in a wild and remote landscape. Its central focus is the Great Rift, a 62-mile long crack in the earth's crust. The Great Rift is the source of a remarkably preserved volcanic landscape with an array of exceptional features. Craters, cinder cones, lava tubes, deep cracks, and vast lava fields form a strangely beautiful volcanic sea on central Idaho's Snake River Plain. Located in central Idaho, approximately 160 miles east of Boise, the Monument was established in 1924 by President Coolidge. It was expanded in 2000 and now includes 661,000 additional acres of federal land. Truly a wonder to see!



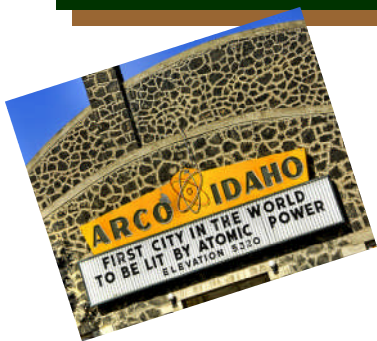
Looking out over the flat expanse south of **Arco**, it's understandable why it has been used for nuclear reactor experimentation and development. Any slip ups would render uninhabitable a plain already devoid of trees or towns. It's pretty empty here still, with most of the 900-square mile **Idaho National Engineering Laboratory** still closed to the public. A historical marker at a scenic pull-off brags that "Since 1949, more nuclear reactors -- over 50 of them -- have been built on this plain than anywhere else in the world."



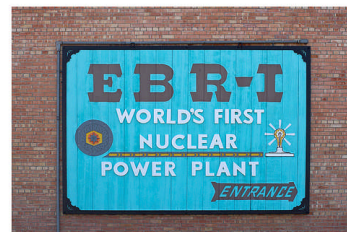

## Idaho (cont.)



The world's first peacetime use of nuclear power occurred when the US Government switched on **Experimental Breeder Reactor #1 (EBR1)** near Arco, Idaho on December 20, 1951. The town of Arco became the first city in the world to be lit by atomic power from a reactor built near EBR-1, the BORAX III reactor, on July 17, 1955. It was only temporary, but the way was paved for commercial use of nuclear power later in the decade. The Arco reactor suffered a partial meltdown -- another World's First, in 1955.



At EBR1, tours are self-guided. See "the hot cell" protected from you by 34 layers of oil-separated glass! They made plutonium-239 in this blocky building. Photography is allowed. Outside, picnic tables are provided under a pair of house-sized atomic jet engines, another experiment. The site now likes to promote its peacetime mission and environmental charter.

At one time **Atomic City**, Idaho was actually called Midway, Idaho. This might have been because the town is halfway between the towns of Blackfoot and Arco. At one time, the glorious road to the nuclear future bisected Atomic City. The gas station in town is also the post office and bar. The store no longer sells gas, however, due to new laws pertaining to its underground gas tanks. Still, the signs around town do provide for one of the country's best photo opportunities!

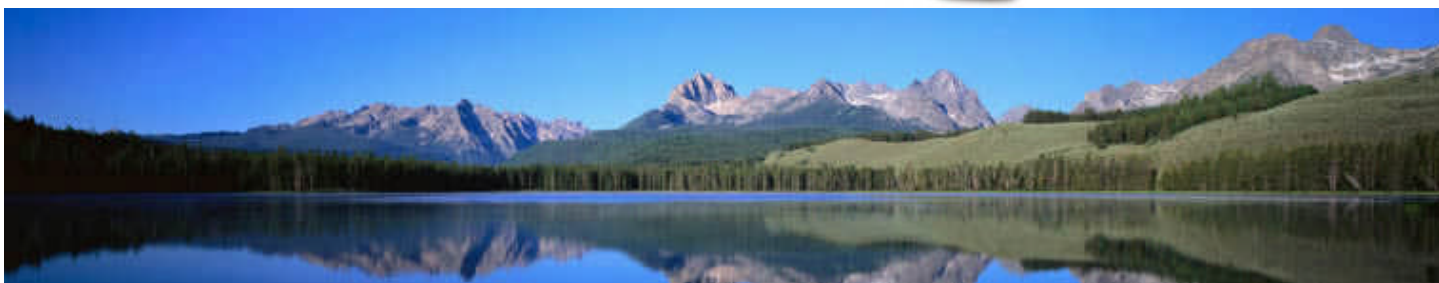


First named Grove City because of the abundance of trees, **Blackfoot** is still a city of trees and parks. The county seat of Bingham County, Blackfoot is the agricultural center of east Idaho's important potato industry. It is known as the Potato Capital of the World, and hosts the **Idaho Potato Museum** where we will stop.



As we travel on to Pocatello, you will continue to be amazed at the beautiful scenery that surrounds us.

Enjoy the evening with a **cookout and wine at a local resident's private home** near Pocatello before retiring to the hotel for our night's stay here. Our destination in the morning is Salt Lake City!

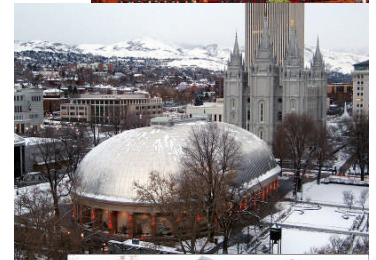




Upon arriving in **Salt Lake City**, we have a step-on guide to narrate a **tour** of the area for us. Salt Lake City is the capital and the most populous city of Utah. The name of the city is often shortened to Salt Lake or SLC. The city was founded in 1847 as Great Salt Lake City by Brigham Young and his Mormon followers, who extensively irrigated and cultivated the arid valley, and continued to face legal prosecution from the U.S. government for their practice of polygamy, which was officially discontinued in 1890 in order to gain statehood. Although Salt Lake City is still home to the headquarters of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS Church), less than half the population of Salt Lake City proper is Mormon today.



**Temple Square** in Salt Lake City, is Utah's most popular tourist destination. Part of its appeal lies in its accessibility: three city blocks in downtown Salt Lake City contain nearly 20 attractions related to Mormon pioneer history and genealogy, including the **Salt Lake Temple**, the **Tabernacle**, and the **Family History Library**.



SALT LAKE 2002

Mining booms and the construction of the first transcontinental railroad initially brought economic growth, and the city was nicknamed the Crossroads of the West. Salt Lake City has since developed a strong outdoor recreation tourist industry based primarily on skiing. Salt Lake City was host to the 2002 Winter Olympics and is the industrial banking center of the United States.



Standing at the overlook within the **Bingham Canyon Mine**, we will see, hear, and feel the breathtaking and awesome magnitude of the of more than 100 years of work.

From the overlook, you can watch 240 and 320 ton capacity haulage trucks deliver copper ore to the in-pit crusher, where the material is reduced to the size of soccer balls before being loaded onto a five-mile conveyor that carries the ore to the Coperton Concentrator. Take a look at these fascinating facts:



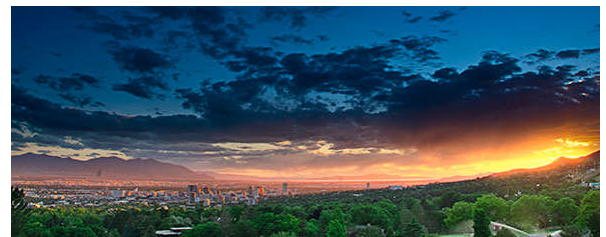
- Kennecott's Bingham Canyon Mine has produced more copper than any mine in history - about 18.7 million tons.
- The mine is 2-3/4 miles across at the top and 3/4 of a mile deep. You could stack two Sears Towers (now known as the Willis Building) on top of each other and still not reach the top of the mine.
- If you stretched out all the roads in the open pit mine, you'd have 500 miles of roadway - enough to reach from Salt Lake City to Denver.



With so many things to see and do in Salt Lake City, we will be staying overnight here...and right by Temple Square!

Keep your cameras handy as we depart Salt Lake and continue our journey toward

**Provo and Price**, Utah. Right in the middle of Utah's Castle Country, the area has a large concentration of prehistoric rock art sites. The surrounding scenery is spectacular, featuring fascinating geological formations, lakes and unusual vegetation.





## Utah (cont.)

It's Day 12 and we are departing Salt Lake City and traveling on toward Provo and Price, Utah. There is still much more to see!

*Provo, Utah*



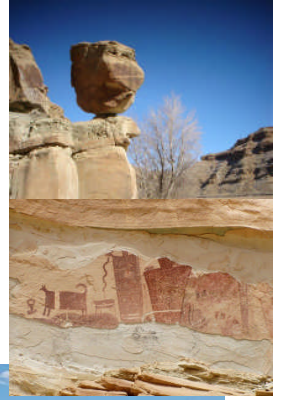
**Provo** is home to Brigham Young University, one of the largest private higher education institutions in the United States, which is operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Provo is also home to the largest Missionary Training Center for the LDS church.



The city of **Price** is home to the College of Eastern Utah, as well as the large CEU Prehistoric Museum affiliated with the college. Price is located within short distances from both Nine Mile Canyon and the Manti-La Sal National Forest. The city is noted for its history as a mining town, and its Greek Orthodox/Catholic/Mormon split population.



We make it into another state yet this evening, stopping for the night in Grand Junction, Colorado.



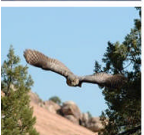
## Colorado



**Colorado National Monument** preserves one of the grand landscapes of the American West. But this treasure is much more than a monument. Towering monoliths exist within a vast plateau-and-canyon panorama. We experience sheer-walled, red rock canyons along the twists and turns of Rim Rock Drive, where you may spy bighorn sheep and soaring eagles.



A **Colorado farm tour** will complete our day...it's onward to beautiful Grand Junction to stay the night.



## Colorado (cont.)



**Grand Junction, Colorado**, is the largest city in western Colorado. It is located along the Colorado River, where it receives the Gunnison River from the south. The name "Grand" refers to the historical upper Colorado River until renamed in 1921, and the word "Junction" is from the joining of the Colorado and Gunnison rivers. Hence, Grand Junction has been given the nickname "River City". The local landscape features canyons, rivers and fertile land featuring Grand Valley, a major fruit-growing region.



Many winemakers and peach growers are located in Grand Valley.

The town of **Vail** was established in 1966 at the base of Vail Ski Resort, which opened in December 1962. The town is famous for having the second largest single ski mountain in North America (after Whistler Blackcomb) and other winter sports in addition to being a year round destination for outdoor activities. You will have the opportunity to **eat and shop** in this quaint town.



**Denver**, the mile high city, has some interesting history....

- Local boosters named the frontier mining camp on the South Platte River "Denver" after Kansas Territorial Governor James Denver in hopes of gaining political favor. Unfortunately, Denver had retired by the time they named the town.
- There were originally three separate towns, with three separate names, where Denver now stands. In 1859, the other names were dropped in return for a barrel of whiskey to be shared by all.
- Fittingly enough, the first permanent structure in Denver was a saloon.
- Despite being warned by Indians not to build there, early settlers didn't listen. In its first few years, Denver was destroyed twice, once by fire and once by flood.
- Denver is one of the few cities in history that was not built on a road, railroad, lake, navigable river or body of water when it was founded. It just happened to be where the first few flakes of gold were found in 1858.

Denver will be our stop for the night, and tomorrow we make our way back to Wichita, Kansas. An **ice cream stop at a private home in Hays** will be a welcomed treat. Be assured that more fun still awaits you on the bus as we are in the home-stretch back to the Air Capital city.
